CONTENT STATEMENT: Teens will experience the financial benefit of using basic tax forms to file a tax return, assuming they earned taxable income.

ESTIMATED TIME: 50 minutes

MATERIALS NEEDED: Each student needs their own computer with Internet connection; Sample Check (Included); Projector with Internet;

KEY VOCABULARY/TERMS: W4, W2, 1040, Social Security Tax, Medicare Tax, Payroll Tax

WHY THIS MATTERS TO YOU NOW: Teens who earned less than \$6,000 can likely anticipate a sizable refund if they file a tax return.

- 1. Project the TAX CALCULATOR: ESTIMATE YOUR TAX REFUND FOR FREE and distribute (or project) the example paycheck. Point out that that the purpose of this exercise to exhibit the benefit of a teenager living at home and working a part time job filing a tax return. Enter the following information:
 - 1. Select: Single
 - 2. Select: Zero dependents
- Enter: Birthdate: 05/06/2001
- 1. Select: Employment (W2)
- 2. Enter: Total Wages: \$6,000
- 3. Enter: Federal Income Taxes Withheld: \$374
- Enter: State Income Tax Withheld: \$39
- Skip Expenses
- 1. What is the anticipated refund? ___\$374
- 2. Use this as an opportunity to incentivize student to understand basic tax forms and file for their tax returns.
- 2. Use the IRS Tax Tutorial (Need hints on completing a W4) to review with students' basic vocabulary and concepts.
- 3. Explain to students that they will participate in two short tax simulations using the IRS tax simulations and discuss their experience. The goal is for the students to experience with common tax forms for teens: W4, W2, 1040EZ.
 - 1. Lawrence Red Owl Simulation 1: Completing Form W-4
 - 2. Cicely King Simulation 2: Using Your W-2 to File Your 1040EZ
- 4. Have students take the Module 1: Payroll Taxes and Federal Income Tax Withholding Assessment: Payroll Taxes and Federal Income Tax Withholding

5. Facilitate a full-class discussion to review any remaining questions and reflect upon the lessons learned during the simulation.

OPTIONAL: Share with students that they can receive free tax file software from the IRS if their income is below \$62,000. Click here to show students where they can find the software.

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
